#### **Remembering Laura Fischer**

Laura Fischer, 86, of Boulder passed away 27 February 2016. Laura was a member of LWVBC for six years when she was a resident at Frasier Meadows. She attended many League events, including Tuesday afternoon Unit meetings. Laura felt the importance of the Civil Liberties committee work. She made a presentation "From Tea to Tea: Protest in the United States" for their 2014 unit meeting on protests. Laura was also active on the Schools Committee and not long before she died, attended the 2016 Programming Planning meeting at Frasier.

Laura was born in White Plains, New York. She earned a BA degree in education and an MA in special education before starting a long and productive career as the Learning Disabilities Coordinator at the University of Colorado. She and her husband, Irwin, were among the founders of Congregation Har Hashem. Laura was a pillar to her community, a compassionate, brilliant mother, sister, grandmother, wife, leader, organizer and writer. She touched many people's hearts and helped many young students conquer their difficulties.

Laura and Irwin had three children, Howard Fischer, Maxine Becker and Lisa Kolodny. In addition to her children, she is survived by four grandchildren and a sister.

League members shared their memories of Laura as a very positive person who was extremely nice, always wore a smile and showed real interest in others.

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#### Comments on 2016-2017 Budget


From Peggy Leech, Budget Committee Leader


In this issue of the Voter, you will find the proposed 2016-2017 budget. This was prepared by the Budget Committee (Lois Linsky, Frieda Holley, and myself) and approved by the board, subject to approval by the membership at the Annual Meeting on May 7. I wanted to mention a few points in advance, so you can be aware of them before the meeting.

You may notice a large increase in the Income section, Proceeds from Activities. The Budget Committee felt that we can substantially increase our grocery card income, so we put a goal into the budget to challenge our members. This is such an easy way to raise money for LWVBC, and we would like to encourage all of our members to participate. Just ask any board member for details, and I am sure you will hear more about this.

Another change this year is that we have rearranged the reporting to better reflect our new focus as a result of the Strategic Planning we did last year. We have a new section called Community Engagement, which includes various activities for community outreach and engagement with the Latino and youth communities and partner organizations. We have also developed some pie charts so that we can all visualize where our income is coming from and where it is being spent.

If you have any questions or wish to discuss anything about the budget before the Annual Meeting, please feel free to contact any of the Budget Committee members. And, of course, discussion is welcome at the Annual Meeting.

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### **Financial Review/Audit Committee Report**

From Marlys Robertson and Deborah Vink, Financial Review/Audit Committee

We, the Audit Committee, have reviewed the books of the League of Women Voters of Boulder County (LWVBC), examined the records of revenue and expenditures, beginning and ending cash balances, cash flows and bank statements. The books are an accurate reflection of the financial condition of the LWV of Boulder County for the fiscal year 2014-2015 and the results of its operations and cash flows for the fiscal year.

### **LWVBC Program Planning, January 2016**

Submitted by Jeannette Hillery

Program Planning for local and national was held on January 13, 2016. There were a total of 36 people who attended the meetings.

LWVBC program was accepted without any changes.

LWVUS: Basically accept all positions. The afternoon group of 2/3 of the members suggested that under the Equality of Opportunity position, Federal Role in Public Education that the words "and higher education" be added, so that the position in brief would read" Support federal policies that provide an equitable, quality public education for all children pre –K through grade 12 "and higher education."

We are supporting LWVCO concurrence at national convention on Behavioral Health which would be included under Social Policy, the Health Care position.

There was a suggestion from the afternoon group to ask National for a by-law change regarding membership. It would ask to drop citizenship requirement at League meetings if you are a participating member. They would have full voting membership. Minnesota is also requesting a similar change. This would help us with younger members and minority communities.

There is a recommendation for National to consider a name change. Report by Sara Michl. This will be sent with the report to national.

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# **Taking Action: Remarkable National League Leader Coming to Boulder County**

Mary Wilson is coming to Boulder, and we will have the opportunity to hear her speak on "Immigration: Where Do We Stand and What Can We Do?"

If you haven't been in the League for very long, you might ask, "Who is Mary Wilson?" She is an attorney practicing in New Mexico, and she is past national League President, which demands anyone's respect. Her two terms spanned the period from 2006-2010 when our current President, Elisabeth MacNamara, was elected.

During her tenure, the national study on Immigration was undertaken. Also Vote411 was initiated during that time. Mary lobbied for the Affordable Care Act, and, immediately after the Citizens United decision she testified before a Senate Committee chaired by Sen. Dianne Feinstein, encouraging the Senate to develop and pass legislation that would at least require more disclosure about the contributors to PACs. (Mary says that during the hearing, Sen. Feinstein took the opportunity to tell everyone that she got her start in politics as a member of the League.) She was honored by Oxfam with a Sisters on the Planet Climate Leader award because of her personal work on the issue of climate change, particularly lobbying Congress about the adverse effect climate change was having on women around the world.

She lives with her husband on a ranch that was homesteaded by her husband's grandfather in 1914. She originally comes from that part of Ohio which is near where Ohio, Kentucky and West Virginia come together.

Because of her knowledge and expertise, Mary was invited to participate in the Conference on World Affairs this year. Since she is in town anyway, she has graciously agreed to be the center point for an LWVBC event.

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### **Taking Action: Strategic Planning - 4th Quarter Peek**

It's been a busy year implementing the first strategic plan for the LWVBC. We've achieved some significant goals and are about to enter the last quarter of our action phase for 2015-16. The high spots for this spring include:

**Fund Development** - with plans for two or three grant applications to the LWVCO, The Community Foundation of Boulder County and some funding appeals to businesses in the county

**Membership** - with the aim of writing an action plan including smart goals

Attendance - which has remained steady during our transition from traditional Units to the broader based Community Meetings. During the fall and winter, we conducted the business of consensus meetings and program planning which are naturally limited in appeal to LWVBC members. As we eased into spring we conducted successful Community Meetings on Schools/Common Core, Transportation, Living Wage and Behavioral Health. We have our fifth meeting, April 6, on the topic of Immigration. This event will be featuring Mary Wilson, a former LWVUS President and doubles as a fund raising opportunity. The completed meetings were quite successful in engaging and educating the public regarding issues of interest to the League. Successful because we maintained the usual numbers of members (8-13 per meeting) and added many non-members to the attendance lists (2-35 per meeting). We engaged at least 65 people who would not otherwise have been touched by the LWVBC. We made contacts and found opportunities to take our messages beyond the membership, meeting the primary mission of the League to influence policy through education and advocacy.

The strategic planning process for the LWVBC will continue with the monitoring of progress and refinement of the initial goals, development of new goals, and continued reporting to the membership. The Strategic Planning Task Force welcomes your feedback at any time. Please call or email:

### **Campaign Finance Reform Team News**

The CFR team is adding a new dimension. We will be looking at the details of all the existing publicly financed campaign systems in U.S. cities and states. The majority of people now understand that the government is essentially working for a relatively few wealthy interests who contribute vast amounts of money to political campaigns. Out-of-State money is coming into Colorado to influence our state and even local elections. Much of it comes from undisclosed sources. New rules and regulations are not likely to work well as loopholes are always found and enforcement is difficult. Even with the allowed limits on donations the more affluent are often able to have more influence than those who are less affluent. We welcome anyone to join us who is interested in working on this effort.

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# ColoradoCare, Amendment 69, Universal Health Care Presentation

On March 19th, as part of Community Outreach, the League of Women Voters of Boulder County had a table display at a community forum at which State Senator Irene Aguilar discussed ColoradoCare, Amendment 69. "ColoradoCare is a resident-owned, non-governmental health care financing system designed to ensure comprehensive, quality, accessible, lifetime health care for every Colorado resident." LWVCO supports Amendment 69, and the table display included the LWVCO's position, the LWVBC Health Care position, membership brochures, and other items. The forum was hosted by the Boulder County AIDS Project in partnership with the Beacon Center for Infectious Diseases. Attendees learned more about the proposed amendment and were able to ask questions.

Attending from the League were Mary Anna Dunn, Peggy and Mary Leech, Frieda and Dick Holley, and Maryann Balassa. LWVBC intends to hold informational sessions on Amendment 69 in the future.



### **Taking Action: Voter Registration Services**

Anyone who attended a Colorado caucus on March 1<sup>st</sup> knows that the 2016 Presidential campaign has generated unprecedented voter interest. According to the *Daily Camera*, more than 23,500 people voted in the Boulder County Democratic caucuses. Hundreds more Democratic caucus-goers were turned away without having had the opportunity to participate in their precinct caucuses. (*See Daily Camera* article "In wake of Boulder County's chaotic night, a push to bury the caucus" posted 03/02/2016).

Six million Americans failed to vote in 2008 because they had missed a voter registration deadline or didn't know how to register to vote. In this highly contested election year the LWVBC is making a concerted effort to get as many people registered to vote as possible. For example, in March we conducted two voter registration drives (VRDs). In a VRD at Front Range Community College on March 16<sup>th</sup>, Susan Saunders and Ruth Stemler registered 16 people to vote and helped 15 others update their voter records. On March 29<sup>th</sup>, Deborah Smith and Susan Saunders conducted a VRD at Doing Democracy Day in Longmont, resulting in approximately 12 new registered voters!

Currently, we have the following VRD events scheduled with more on the horizon:

- April 30, 2016: Cinco de Mayo, Longmont, 11:00-6:00 p.m.; and

### **Andrew Romanoff on Mental Health in Colorado**

Attendance was standing room only at the Firehouse Art Center in Longmont for the Health Care Team's March 8 event featuring Andrew Romanoff, President and CEO of Mental Health Colorado.


Mr. Romanoff focused on how we can make Colorado a leader in treating and preventing mental health disorders, including substance abuse. He emphasized the benefits of early intervention and the risks of neglecting behavioral health signs and needs. Among his striking statistics were these: When a child or youth is identified as needing further assistance for behavioral health, having to go elsewhere to meet with a professional means a 10% likelihood of follow-up. In contrast, if the health care professional is in the school, follow-up is likely 90% of the time.

Mental Health Colorado will be focusing in the coming year on promoting the presence of behavioral health providers in all Colorado schools. LWVCO's updated health care position statement will allow us to support this effort.


